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Constitution Day Celebration

“I regard it [the Constitution] as the work of the purest patriots and wisest statesmen that ever existed, aided by the smiles of a benign Providence; it almost appears a “Divine interposition in our behalf...the hand that destroys our Constitution rends our Union asun-

The US Constitution truly is an inspired document. We should be proud of It and do our utmost to preserve it.

As you see from the enclosed flyer, Eagle Forum of California and Sonoma County Eagle Forum are hosting our fourth annual Constitution Day Breakfast and Celebration on September 15. We invite all of you to join us in honoring our great US Constitution. If you cannot be with us in person, we hope you can have your own celebration and encourage your schools to honor this day by a special program or assembly.

In 1952, a joint resolution of Congress was passed designating September 17th as Citizenship Day, the day to commemorate the signing of the Constitution of the USA on September 17, 1787.

In 1956, Congress set aside the week of September 17 as Constitution Week, and requested all future Presidents of our nation to continue to establish this week by Proclamation. Indented below is how the current federal law reads. (Notice section (b) that is highlighted. This mandates that all public schools that receive federal funds hold an educational program on the US Constitution on September 17 for all students served by the educational institution):

Public Law 108-477 SEC. 111. (a) The head of each Federal agency or department shall—(1) provide each new employee of the agency or department with educational and training materials concerning the United States Constitution as part of the orientation materials provided to the new employee; and (2) provide

educational and training materials concerning the United States Constitution to each employee of the agency or department on September 17 of each year. (b) **Each educational institution that receives Federal funds for a fiscal year shall hold an educational program on the United States Constitution on September 17 of such year for the students served by the educational institution.**

What Are The Greatest Threats To the Constitution Today?"

Will Durant, the famous world historian, wrote in his first volume that it takes four elements to create a strong civilization and make it last. When any of those four elements begin to be destroyed or to crumble, so goes the civilization. What are those elements? 1) Morals and religion, 2) education to pass on to the next generation what the civilization regards as important, 3) A form of government, 4) an economic system.

The United State of America at one time was very strong in these four basic elements but they are all under attack today:

Morals, Religion, and Education: Our nation was founded on Biblical principles, strong Christian morals and ethics, as the vast majority of early Americans were devout Christians coming here seeking religious liberty. Our Founding Fathers based much of the Constitution on Common Law which comes from the Bible. Morals and Biblical principles used to be allowed to be taught in our public schools. The first primer used in the first grade was the Bible, then later the New England Primer that was based on the Bible.

It wasn't until 1962, when the ruling of the Earl Warren Supreme Court took the Bible, prayer and our Judeo-Christian heritage out of the schools and allowed the gods of secular humanism, multi-culturalism, diversity, environmentalism, evolution, earth worship, New Age, free sex, and Marxism to fill the void left in the hearts of our nation's school children. The Year 1962 is called a "pivotal" year because it had such a marked, profound affect on our nation. According to a series of charts shown by David Barton of the Wallbuilders, and a video called "*America's Godly Heritage*," things were going pretty well in our nation until 1962. Since that time the rate of teenage pregnancies has skyrocketed 553%; the rate of STDs, Sexually Transmitted Diseases has risen 226% - now one in five teenagers is so affected. Since 1962, the divorce rate has also skyrocketed by 117%. Now more than 50 % of our nation's marriages end in divorce. The rate of couples just living together, instead of getting married is up 536%. The violent crime rate has greatly increased by 794%. How has this affected learning? The average score of SAT tests has gone down by 100 points, all since 1962. It is obviously not very good for our nation to have removed God from our public schools. (These statistics are from David Barton and Wall Builders, and the video "*America's Godly Heritage*")

Strong Government – a Republic: Our founding fathers, after doing much historical research, established a wonderful form of government – a Representative Republic, based on the firm rule of law with an inspired, binding, written Constitution. The abuse of government power was put in check by creating three branches of authority: legislative, executive, and judicial, formed to put a check and balance on each other thus limiting the power of government.

What has happened since to our Republic? Our nation is often not referred to as a Republic anymore, but as a Democracy. This is also what is primarily taught in our public schools. Is that true? Are we now a democracy? What is the difference? A democracy is rule by the majority, or mob rule, or rule by taking a poll as to what the majority are thinking on a given issue. Is that

a good thing? If it were then, why did our founding fathers never refer to us as a democracy but actually warned us against ever becoming such?

What has happened to our Constitution? It doesn't seem to matter any more if the issue that the latest poll is being taken for or if the issue our elected officials are voting on is in accordance with or in violation of the Constitution. The Constitution is often just ignored. Our elected officials, who have all taken oaths to uphold the Constitution are usually the ones ignoring it the most. By the bills they vote on and the laws they are now passing, one wonders if most of them have ever even read the Constitution?

Property Rights Under Attack: One way our form of government is being destroyed is through the attack on what our founding fathers felt was essential in the preservation of our freedoms – the right to own and do with our property what we deemed right. Attacks on our property are coming through many forms through regulatory takings and through the Kelo decision of the Supreme Court – the decision that expands eminent domain to take away more property for the excuse of bringing in more tax revenue "for the common good."

The Movement to Establish a North American Union: Of course, the biggest threat to our form of government, to our Constitution, to our freedoms and entire American way of life is what Eagle Forum has been most concerned about all year – the movement to form a regional government of Canada, Mexico, and the United States, united in one big North American Union.

Strong Economy: During the 1800s, we had a good economic system based on the coinage of gold and silver coins. When the government started printing paper money, it was clearly printed on the dollar bill, "redeemable for its value in gold and silver." Our founding fathers believed in a free-market system and free enterprise, with little government control. They had seen what happened in England where a central bank was established and how it caused King George and the government to be in great debt.

Our founding fathers did not want the establishment of a central bank that becomes a monopoly and eliminates all privately owned banks, thus eliminating competition in keeping interest rates low. Then they can raise rates and create lots of debt without any restraints..

Then what happened? Our own version of a US central bank was created in 1913. The creators of it, international bankers, tried to deceive the American people by not calling it a bank, but instead The Federal Reserve. But it is not Federal – it is owned and operated by an international cartel of wealthy and powerful bankers. It is everything that a government-controlled central bank is. It has created a monopoly controlling the money of our nation. Privately owned banks have all but disappeared. The Federal Reserve gets to set all interest rates, gets to continue to raise them and to increase inflation by printing more and more money, no longer backed by gold and silver. We were taken off the gold standard under FDR and taken off the silver standard under Nixon. Now there is no limit to the amount of paper money that can be printed and the inflation that that creates.

THE INFLUENCE OF UN GLOBAL TREATIES

UN dictates are being used to change laws in the US on all levels, even our housing patterns! There are 200 UN meetings a year held around the world dealing with many issues. The Kyoto Treaty, although we didn't sign it, still has a great influence in the U.S. For environmental reasons MTBE was added to our gasoline. It was abandoned when found to have infiltrated water systems as well as causing cancer. The additive replacement Ethanol has other disadvantages besides being an expensive substitute. We are encouraged to drive less, ride the bike more, and walk everywhere possible. This will cut down on pollution and the need to buy foreign oil.

Agenda 21 encompasses the 1992 Biodiversity Treaty including the Ecosystem Management, Biosphere Reserve Lands, and the Wildlands Project all of which have impacted our society. Proceeding the Kyoto and other global environmental meetings the US was declared as using the most energy and causing more than our share of pollution. China, Mexico and other countries that are greater polluters were exempt because they are "evolving nations."

Many people didn't connect Clinton's signing on to NAFTA with an increase in pollution even though this "agreement" calls for the free flow of people and goods across the border. Nothing is more polluting than a mass of people and trucks entering our southwestern states.

One thing begets another, so in 1999 the NAFTA/GATT International Highway was started in order to accommodate all the NAFTA imported goods entering the ports of Long Beach and Los Angeles. People living in the port cities are complaining about all the increased pollution due to the abundance of ships and land vehicles being used to transport the imports.

How is this government induced problem solved? By instituting more government regulations. URBAN PLANNING INTERNATIONAL

Wayne Ratkovich is the appointed chairman of the Urban Land Institute (ULI) an international organization with 35,000 members in the U.S. and foreign countries. Coincidentally Ratkovich's U.S. company is involved in large-scale redevelopment in urban planning combining the mix of retail, office, entertainment and mixed-use projects. The ULI plans strategies for low-income and distressed neighborhoods. In addition the Urban Plan is bringing urban development into the public high schools as part of their regular curriculum. Thus the populace will be trained in school to accept the advantages of living in a George Orwell world of restricted group think, group living mentality.

INTERNATIONAL TREATY PLANS GO LOCAL

We have been convinced that our lifestyles must be adjusted to the global warming problem. The government purposes elimination of as much private travel as possible under the guise of saving energy and reducing pollution. Several restrictions on industry along with our trade policies, have resulted in the loss of our manufacturing base.

Urban living fits the environmental agenda. Because NAFTA has caused so many companies to leave the US, industrial buildings are left vacant. Cities are turning these vacant structures into apartment lofts. People are living above stores, some even live above traffic hubs! This is convenient because public transportation will replace private transportation. Urban living combines housing, business entertainment, and perhaps medical offices all in one area. Cars will be optional or community owned and rented on a sign-up basis. Everything will be in walking distance.

Advertised, Flex-space condo, designed for work and residential use, a 17 story adaptive reuse development in downtown Los Angeles. Warehouse lofts and work-live lofts, are being built in downtown Las Vegas. A Westwood Condo Community is close to business as well as the medical facilities of UCLA. A triangle deal for living is in the works near Anaheim Stadium. Warnings have been issued concerning some hi-rise modern residential buildings. Several hi-rise surprises include: some buyers keep late hours, be prepared for noise. Janitors are not restricted to certain hours. Besides mortgage payments and taxes, there are monthly association dues from \$750 to \$1,200. Pets may not be allowed.

Developers plan a \$1-billion Los Angeles condo complex that will rise to 76 stories, the tallest residential building west of Chicago. The complex includes another 43 -story tower and a 14 -story hotel.

Urban living is growing nationwide. Meanwhile, the luxury of private homes and property are on the decline. Use of eminent

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domain has hastened this trend. The traditional zoning division between industrial and residential is fading.

GOVERNMENT INVOLVEMENT IN HOUSING

The increasing demand for the placement of those with drug and alcohol addiction has started a new housing dilemma. People who purchased their home in a single-family residential area find the zoning can be reversed without their knowledge.

Individuals or organizations stand to make large financial gains by buying residential homes and turning them into group homes for "troubled people." It is acknowledged that addicts need to be separated from those exhibiting the same behavior. Group-housing of addicts causes them to enforce their habit. Drug dealers learn the addresses of the drug residences and travel there to sell drugs. Crime and congested parking result in these single-family neighborhoods where these "sober houses" are placed.

A group home for behavior and fire setting obsessed youths moved next to a woman in Norco. They threw stones and swore at the woman. She put up a yard sign saying, "I don't feel safe, do you? Both the state and federal governments are investigating this lady. A woman in Newport Beach discovered that 30% of all group-housing in California was being located in their city. Complaints to their city council brought out the fact that this is a state ordered program. Further investigation shows the federal government is the enforcer for the state and local community-based group programs.

The Eli Home for abused mothers and children filed a complaint with the federal government against the city of Orange for discriminating against families with children. The Eli organization shelter wanted to house more people by adding 6 more bedrooms. This plan would cause traffic and congestion in the single-family neighborhood. Thus the City rejected the Eli request to enlarge the Home from increasing the facilities from 8 to 28 people. HUD and the Department of Justice became involved. The City said it wasn't a case of discrimination but a case of zoning and land use. Eli facilities had problems in Anaheim relating to traffic, trash, noise, and overcrowding. The Home sued neighbors for slander but the case was dismissed. The Anaheim City Council rejected Eli's permit but after intervention let the shelter operate without a permit.

In our Orange neighborhood we received a letter announcing the Hudson Lyndsey Group Home Inc. This was identified as

a residential group home treatment facility for emotionally disturbed youths from 8 to 15. Oprah Winfrey is the guardian angel of this group that is inspired by the AIDS epidemic in Africa which relates to the homeless in the (our?) area. They spoke of yard and bake sales, collecting bottles, cans, and spare change from donors. The letter was a page-long and signed by a Group Home Social Worker. Some of these "non-profit" organizations don't even have permits. There is no way anyone in the neighborhood can find out the status of these group houses. This venture didn't seem successful because the group house is up for sale. There are still other residential zoning rules waiting to be broken.

COMING TO A NEIGHBORHOOD NEAR YOU?

If you haven't experienced a home for alcoholics, drug addicts or people with behavior problems residing in your neighborhood, don't count your blessings too soon. Prison overcrowding in California is causing public attention. The creation of 16,000 "re-entry beds" to be located in the home communities of prisoners serving the last year of their prison sentences is described as the ideal situation. Communities will become the rehabilitation "re-entry bed" laboratories.

But first the prisoners must be convinced to give up their crowded conditions and relocate in the community. A film was



produced advertising tasty meals, Ping-Pong, along with TV! This was shown as a marketing tool to influence inmates to leave their cell mates and venture elsewhere in the community

Theories on rehabilitation con-

tend that prisoners will better acclimate to communities where they will return for counseling if they are familiar with their surroundings. Drug counselors and job trainers would profit as community providers. However the idea of thousands of felony convicts moving into local neighborhoods might not be welcomed. Assemblyman Todd Spitzer of Orange is adamant about prisoners returning to the community. He says the ex-convicts will be more apt to turn their lives around with this program.

The whole community unravels when politicians force single family communities to house "sober homes" or re-entry bed dwellings for convicts. This means no homeowner is secure in their choice of residence.

Ethanol is Nothing More Than a Very Expensive Moonshine

Thanks to Charlie Peters of Clean Air Performance Professions (CAPP) for keeping us alerted on the information regarding Ethanol. Much of this was taken from an article he sent called "Nothing Clear in Ethanol Debate, by Jim Pfiffer, of Star Gazette News, Aug. 3, 2007.

David Pimental, a retired ecology and ag sciences professor at Cornell University, has been researching ethanol since the early 1970s.

He states that we are not being told the truth about ethanol by either the government or its producers. The following is a summary of what he says we are not being told:

Ethanol will not reduce our dependence on foreign oil.



Last year Americans used 20 percent of all U.S. grown corn to make 5 billion gallons of ethanol, says the U.S. Department of Energy. "The 5 billion gallons of ethanol is slightly less than 1 percent of our total oil use. If we used 100 percent of all the corn grown in the U.S. it would provide only 7 percent of our total petroleum use. There is no way the

ethanol production will make us oil independent."

The production of ethanol is very costly. The demand for corn-to-ethanol has raised the price of corn from \$2 a bushel to nearly \$4 a bushel in the last year. Farmers have to pay more for feed corn for their livestock. Corn also requires plenty of fertilizer, herbicides,

insecticides and irrigation. Lots of energy is needed to produce and transport those chemicals, as well as the fuel to run the farm machinery to apply the chemicals and harvest the corn. That cost is passed on to consumers in higher prices for everything from milk, eggs, poultry and steaks. Many farmers are being forced out of business. Fewer farmers means fewer fields of corn, which will then further inflate food prices and the cost of ethanol.

The production of ethanol is using up a huge amount of energy and oil itself: An acre of corn can be processed into about 328 gallons of ethanol. But planting, growing and harvesting that much corn requires about 140 gallons of fossil fuels and costs \$347 per acre. That's \$1.05 for a gallon of ethanol before the corn even leaves the farm. Then the corn must be transported by truck to the ethanol plants and from the plants to the gas stations, which burns more fossil fuels.

More energy is needed to convert the corn into ethanol at the processing plants. "Nearly 70 percent more energy is needed to make ethanol than the energy that is actually released from burning ethanol," Pimental says. "It costs about 95 cents to make a gallon of gasoline compared to \$1.74 to produce a gallon of corn ethanol"

Ethanol is very corrosive. Unlike natural gas and gasoline, ethanol can't be transported through pipelines, because it corrodes pipes and binds with moisture in the pipes, decreasing ethanol's value. It causes the same corrosion on your car's engine.

Ethanol does not contain as much energy as gasoline. A gallon of ethanol has only two-thirds the amount of energy found in a gallon of gasoline. That means you have to burn one-third more ethanol in your car to travel the same distance as you would from a gallon of gasoline.

Ethanol pollutes the environment: All the energy needed to grow, harvest, transport and distill corn into ethanol pollutes the environment and adds more carbon dioxide to the atmosphere. There is also CO₂ released into the atmosphere when the yeast converts the corn sugar into alcohol. "You never hear about that from the pro-ethanol people," Pimental

adds.

"Moonshine, white lightning, corn squeezings. They are slang names for a potent distilled whiskey that has been made in America, usually illegally, since the 1700s. Now, 300 years later, moonshine is referred to by its chemical name, ethanol, and is making news as a bio-fuel that will reduce our dependence on foreign oil and save money and the environment. The problem is those claims are bull, says Ray Hughson, an Erin dairy farmer who grows corn to feed his cows. "It's just a way for the big companies who make ethanol to make money."

The pro-ethanol debate is being promoted by the big ethanol producers. "They are the ones who help get various congressmen and the president elected to support the ethanol scam," Pimental says. "It's all about big money." Of course, the ethanol supporters disagree. A 2002 U.S. Department of Agriculture study supposedly found that making

corn into ethanol is energy efficient and produces 34 percent more energy than it takes to make it. Why would the USDA make that claim if it were not true? Probably because the USDA works hard to convince America that agriculture subsidies are good for the nation. If converting corn into ethanol is so cost effective, why does it require federal subsidies? "If we pulled the \$6 billion in government subsidies away from ethanol production it would fall flat on its face," Pimental says. "Not surprisingly, the same thing happens when you drink too much moonshine."

During the next few days, Anthony's video clip was viewed by thousands of people who voted on it. It consistently ranked in the top four questions that were posted on the ABC News website. Everybody was very excited about this opportunity for Anthony. People the Moreno Family knew were networking across the country through Facebook and urging people to vote for the clip.

The question Anthony posed to Congressman Ron Paul was asking what his plans were to contain terrorism and weapons of mass destruction in the Middle East after he removed US troops from Iraq, should he be elected President of the United States.

The Moreno Family excitedly watched the Sunday debate, August 5, expecting to

see the video clip and Anthony's question any moment. Unfortunately, it was not aired. Only one question was electronically submitted. Perhaps, there was not enough time. But the family was thankful that Anthony's question received as much recognition as it did on the ABC News website, and this experience helped them to all get up early and watch the debates and to take even more of an interest in the issues that were discussed.

Eagle Forum is very proud of Anthony. State President, Orlean Koehle, stated, "I was able to see Anthony on the ABC News website asking his question and was very impressed. Legislative Alert for California:

(Thanks to California Family Council for the following update.)

The California Legislature is scheduled to be in recess July 20-August 20 provided the budget bill has passed. The Assembly voted on the budget bill last month and is now in recess. At the time of this newsletter, the Senate is still at an impasse regarding the passage of the budget bill. Since the Senate has not approved the bill, technically it remains in session this week. The next scheduled committee hearings are August 20.

The Assembly

SB 777 - When the Assembly reconvenes (scheduled on August 20), SB 777 will be on the floor for consideration. This bill promotes religious discrimination and re-writes laws to protect sexual orientation. Passage of this bill would essentially silence students and teachers from the free expression of any beliefs and opinions contrary to a total and complete acceptance of all forms of sexual behavior.

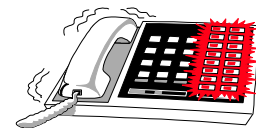

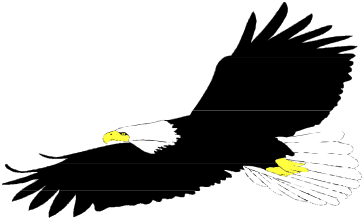
